Advertising rates

The cost of progress

The advertising rates for the *Carterton Crier* have increased to reflect the rising costs of production.

This is the first price rise since former editor Jan Farr took over the reins in 2015, and since then all facets of production have ballooned in cost – until now at the sole financial risk of the printer Lamb-Peters in Greytown.

The *Crier* has been run as a community service by Jan, and latterly by me, with everyone working for free. It's time it was brought into the real world. We either pay for what we want, or get less (or nothing).

The *Crier* must be sustainable, and to achieve that it must pay its own way. So many of us praise the quality and content of the *Crier*, when no one in Carterton pays a cent towards its production.

No one, that is, other than our stalwart group of local advertisers who put their money into each monthly issue. Sure, they get valuable

exposure, but there is a large degree of altruism in their continued support.

It's our *Crier*, it's about our town and features our people. As Abe Lincoln said (possibly about something else), it's of the people, by the people, for the people.

The new rates come into effect for the August 2022 issue. They reflect modern trends in that the most valuable advertising spaces, such as front and back cover, attract a premium. There is no longer any cost saving in advertising in black and white, as the advertising space is still just as valuable.

We have introduced a new banner advertisement space on the front cover, and a "Special Placement" fee now applies when advertisers stipulate that their advert must go on a certain page.

The Big Bike Film Night returns for 2022 and is pedalling into Carterton on Wednesday 15 June.

Described as a feast of short films devoted to the bicycle and all who ride, The Big Bike Film Night is an annual event that presents an array of local and international short cycling films, selected by Taupō curator Brett Cotter.

"Our 2022 collection contains 12 mesmerising films that are as varied and diverse as you could hope for," says Brett.

"Collectively, these films speak to us about determination, passion and overcoming challenges through their quirky, uplifting,

adventurous and inspiring stories."

This year's treasure chest of films includes one rider's colourful adventure through dramatic landscapes; three friends travelling to the centre of South America on a treacherous 2500-km bike packing and raft trip; a group of young rowdies expressing their individuality through uni-cycling; a bicycle that is transformed into a work of art; and a fixed gear cyclist's obsession with speed.

For Brett, one film in particular stands out. *The Freedom Seat* follows cyclist and humanitarian Naresh Kumar's journey from India to Germany, cycling 8646 km on a tandem bicycle called Kindness, as he informs those he meets about modern day slavery and trafficking. It documents Kumar's daily struggles with weather, language and his own physical wellbeing.

"*The Freedom Seat* is an incomparable expedition combining adventure and humanity," Brett says.

"The power of storytelling is again at the forefront of what The Big Bike Film Night offers and our 2022 collection has something for everyone."


South End School

New green roof adorns welcome whare

Last term a group of students from South End School decided to make a green roof for the welcome whare at the entrance to the food forest.

We decided to make the green roof because it was a form of insulation, provides drainage and looks good.

First we put pond liner and wool on the

roof, then we made a 70% inorganic/30% organic mixture. The inorganic mixture had vermiculite, scoria, limestone and sand. The organic mixture was just compost. We mixed it all together on a big tarp. When it was completely mixed we put it on the roof.

When that was done we started to design the layout of the roof and what plants we should use. We all made a design and then chose which one was the best. After we chose a design we started to plant.

Instead of putting regular plants on the roof we put succulents and small cacti because they are low-maintenance plants.

To begin our commemoration, we sang our school pepeha and followed it with our school haka, “Ko Wairarapa”. We did our best and we all participated.

Next Mr Jackett spoke about why we were there at the commemoration, about Anzac Day and the importance of remembrance. The audience was quiet, yet listening enthusiastically.

After that, each of our four school teams (Kawakawa, Kōwhai, Ākonga and Kahikatea) laid their wreaths with respect. Each wreath was individually designed and created by different groups of people. Those watching were quiet when this took place.

Go Carterton joins forces with Business Wairarapa

Go Carterton held a combined social and special general meeting on Thursday 26 May, the main purpose of which was to consider a proposal from Business Wairarapa (formerly the Wairarapa Chamber of Commerce) to join forces.

Held at the Carterton Events Centre, which sponsored the evening, the meeting was opened by Events Centre Marketing Coordinator Jenni Hall, who outlined the very busy programme of events and shows for 2022. Highlights will include Classics in Carterton, a programme of small ensembles performing in various venues on High St, and the much-awaited return of the Daffodil Festival. The Centre is booked every weekend until the end of the year.

Jenni was followed by Nicola Belsham and Marie-Claire Andrews from Business Wairarapa. They outlined the proposal for Wairarapa business groups to come together under the Business Wairarapa umbrella, providing a much stronger voice for business and economic development in the region. Members of each group in the five towns (including a newly-formed Masterton group) and a Māori business group would automatically become members of Business Wairarapa without having to pay a separate sub. The groups would pay a levy of \$25 per member to the combined organisation.

The special general meeting was then convened at which the proposal was unanimously accepted. A second resolution was passed to increase the Go Carterton sub to \$145 a year to cover the Business Wairarapa levy. Go Carterton now joins Martinborough as the first business groups to accept the proposal.

Carterton members will now enjoy the benefits of Business Wairarapa membership including discounts, the business-to-business app, training opportunities and events, and participating in the delivery of the Wairarapa Development Strategy. Wharekaka Chair speaks at recent meeting

Chair of the Wharekaka Trust Board, Joy Cooper, spoke at a recent meeting of the South Wairarapa Rebus Club.

Wharekaka, an aged care community in Martinborough, provides a range of living and care options from independent villas to hospital-level care.

In the mid-1970s, New Zealand had the highest rate of rest home care in the world. However, in the 1980s the emphasis changed to extend support for home living rather than institutional living, leading to the closure of district health boards' geriatric wards. An additional level of care devolved on to rest homes for which the funding was quite inadequate.

During the 2000s, Wharekaka's substantial shortfall in funds was sustained by a number of bequests and some input from the turnover of villas. However, the recent loss of three registered nurses and Wharekaka's inability to recruit replacements meant it could no longer provide 24-hour hospital care. The Wairarapa District Health Board pays \$15,000 a year more for hospital nurses than for aged-care nurses. Without the added income generated by hospital-level care beds, the Wharekaka Rest Home was no longer economic, and rest home closed on 31 March this year.

Wharekaka continues to support its villa residents and is exploring ways to retain its Meals on Wheels service. It currently supplies around 800 meals a month to elderly and infirm residents in Martinborough, Greytown and Featherston.

Aratoi Museum

Abstract exhibition brings autumnal colour to galleries

Aratoi Wairarapa Museum of Art and History brings a pop of autumnal colour to the galleries this month, with a new abstract exhibition by Masterton local Karen Madoc until 26 June.

The colours and shapes in her work complement the main exhibitions, *Ngā Haerenga/Journeys – Celebrating Matariki* and *Toitū Te Whenua – The Land Will Always Remain*.

Karen is known for her abstract works inspired by an interest in organic forms, landscape, aerial views, alphabets and retro design.

The colourful paintings usually follow a process of layering, washes and sgraffito (scratched). There is an interplay of simple shapes, textural detail and the use of colour to create depth that generates movement and interest over the picture space.

Meanwhile, *Ngā Haerenga/Journeys – Celebrating Matariki* (16 April to 21 August) focuses on navigation throughout New Zealand history. It tells the story of how people navigated oceans to find islands across the Pacific, including Aotearoa New Zealand.

The exhibition shows how explorers would use the sea, the observation of rising and setting stars, and the landscape to navigate. By observing animal migrations of eels, fish, whales and seabirds; cloud formations; and the swell of the sea, these pockets of land were discovered.

Vivid reimagining of historic tour

This year marks a century since New Zealand-born soprano Rosina Buckman undertook an epic homecoming tour, after her farewell concert in London to an audience of 10,000 in the Royal Albert Hall.

In Rosina's entourage were cellist Adelina Leon and pianist-composer Percy Kahn. They performed more than 110 concerts to capacity audiences the length and breadth of New Zealand and Australia over a period of ten months.

One hundred years later, the well-known soprano Rowena Simpson joins the established Hammers & Horsehair duo (pianist Douglas Mews and cellist Robert Ibell) to present a vivid reimagining of that 1922 tour in a salon concert called "Homecoming".

The Homecoming programme delighted audiences in preliminary performances in 2021, with its sparkling music and anecdotes from the 1922 tour. Audience comments included: "It had atmosphere and drama", "Just what we needed in these trying times", and "Delightful evening, narrative told through music was wonderful, with a variety of well-chosen pieces".

In Greytown on 3 July, the group will present period classics from the 1922 tour, such as Ardit's "Il Bacio" and "Love's a Merchant" by Molly Carew for soprano and piano; Percy Kahn's own arrangement of his "Ave Maria" for soprano, cello and keyboard; "Orientale" by Cui; and Rimsky Korsakov's "Chanson Indoue" for cello and piano.

The programme also includes some of their own favourites: "Intermezzo in B flat" by Brahms, and Schubert's "Impromptu in A flat" for piano solo, and "L'Etoile" by Offenbach for soprano, cello and piano.

The music will be interspersed with anecdotes from the 1922 tour, comparing touring life then and now, and incorporating appropriate local or personal history.

Masterton born and bred, Thomas Nikora is one of the Wellington/Wairarapa region's most popular and accomplished pianists and choir directors.

A bit of a prodigy from Makoura College, Thomas has studied with the best at the NZ School of Music, and also fronted for The Flight of the Conchords.

Since 2016 he has been Music Director for the Cantoris Choir, a prestigious Wellington institution for 50 years. WASTEWATER STORAGE RESERVOIR UPGRADE PROJECT

Last month, we had water flowing into Reservoir One of the new reservoir ponds, marking a significant milestone in the project. Filling the reservoir begun after remediation took place to repair the liner damaged by Central Hawkes Bay Earthmovers. The capacity of Reservoir One is around 60,000 cubic meters, or roughly the same size as the existing three storage ponds.

Planning the repairs for Reservoirs 2 and 3 is underway, with the weather and cooler temperatures potentially adding risks to the repair timetable. The work will fall within the previously announced budget of up to \$1.944 million which was approved last December by Council.

ENAKI STREAM REALIGNMENT



Over time, the Enaki stream realigned itself through flood debris build-up. The new alignment

posed a future risk to Belvedere Road and potentially the bridge. Through collaboration with Greater Wellington Regional Council and landowners, we have realigned Enaki Stream back to its 1999 alignment.



URBAN WATER STORAGE

The improvement of the potable water supply and resilience has been divided into 4 phases:

- Phase 1 – Frederick Street treatment plant upgrade
- Phase 2 – 2 x 2000kL Potable Water Storage Tanks
- Phase 3 – Water main between phase 1 and 2 via Lincoln Road.
- Phase 4 – Pump station at Water Tanks.

The bolted steel tank sections have been delivered and are being stored under cover at a local storage facility ready for assembly in August. Construction on the reinforced concrete foundations has started.

Gardening guide

How does your garden grow?



June is not the obvious time to be planting in the vegetable garden, although I did plant a patch of garlic bulbs yesterday – conscious of the fact that the bulbs are going to keep their heads down until spring. They will, though, begin to develop roots and the bulbs will begin to swell.

As for the rest of the vegetable garden, there is not much going on. Soil temperature is down to eight degrees Celsius and that does not induce plant growth. It is soil temperature, not air temperature, that matters. Vegetables such as cabbage and brussels sprouts that are well-established will continue to develop, provided they have had a good upbringing.

The survival part of my garden is the lemon and grapefruit patch. Neither are quite ready for picking but when the day comes, grapefruit with breakfast will start the day refreshingly.

The grapefruit tree has a special role in my garden. On my frequent work visits to Auckland in days gone by, my mother would insist on presenting me with grapefruit to carry home on the plane. So, with grapefruit tucked into pockets and briefcases, the swag came home with me. But grapefruit and lemons grow as well in Carterton as they did in Auckland.



Herb of the month is rosemary: a fragrant evergreen herb native to the Mediterranean. It is used in cooking and in perfumes.

Rose Notes

It's time to plant, move and spray



June is a good month to begin planting new roses. Make sure all your bushes that were diseased are removed (it is good to burn those that were badly diseased). If you are not wanting to keep some of your healthy roses, it's good to swap with friends.

Now is a good time to move plants that you think would benefit from it. Cut back plants you are shifting but leave hard pruning until July.

Spray your plants to kill aphids and mites that are still around. The spray will cause the plants to drop their remaining leaves and go into a dormant state.

Lime sulphur or a copper and oil spray should be used now, but don't use this if your rose is still in bloom.

The rose – a medicinal herb



The rose, whose blooms inspire many a poem of love and romance, is one of the oldest medicinal herbs.

Until the 1930s the rose was considered an official medicine by doctors for both internal and topical treatments. This plant is one of the safest medical herbs to use and can be used for children as well.

There are three main varieties that are still grown for commercial use. Mostly these roses are grown for the production of essential oil and rose water. They are *Rosa gallica*, *Rosa centifolia* and *Rosa damascena cantina*, the later used for rose hip oil.

There was a time in New Zealand when rose hips were collected to produce rose hip syrup, which is high in vitamin C. It was given to children and was also promoted by the Plunket Society. Just three rose hips contain more vitamin C than a whole orange. They also contain a number of other vitamins and minerals.

The rose petals can be made into tincture, lip balm, an infusion or decoction. The Chinese use *Rosa rugosa* flowers to help regulate the liver and spleen meridians.

But wait, there's more – the late Gilian Painter lists over 30 rose recipes in her herb cookbook. Rose fritters, anyone?

Before heading out to collect rose hips or petals, make sure the roses you are collecting from have not been sprayed with chemicals.



Town gains first high-pressure water supply

Investigation into a high-pressure water supply (as opposed to open races) was advocated by its supporters. In 1898 the first public meeting was held to establish that a report should be obtained, followed by a poll of ratepayers.

The Borough Council declined the proposal, indicating that the committee members would have to guarantee to pay the cost of the report for it to proceed, which they agreed to. The report was obtained and presented to Council, but no action was taken, so the committee called a public meeting to explain the project to ratepayers.

Despite a positive reaction in favour of a high-pressure system, no action was taken until 1901, when forward-thinking councillors were elected and ratepayers given the chance to express their opinion. An estimate for a combined water and drainage scheme was obtained for £13,000, with a loan being sought from the Government at a rate of 3.5 percent.

This was declined by the Government on the grounds that it was too large a sum for a small borough to service. Eventually the Government agreed to a loan of £10,000, but only for the water scheme and conditional on no more than half being borrowed in any one year. A ratepayer poll was undertaken in 1902, with the proposal receiving overwhelming approval.

The scheme involved taking water from the Waingawa River in open races to a 1,000,000 gallon reservoir, then through a series of filter beds to a lower reservoir with a capacity of 60,000 gallons – enough for one day’s supply for a town of 4,000 people.

The official opening on 15 September 1904 was attended by a large crowd and dignitaries who were involved in the scheme, including Engineer Coleman Phillips and Mr J Scott representing the contractors.


The ride down the other side is a lesser 10-km gradient, with a more well-trod and cycled path.


