

### **GARDENING GUIDE**

### How does your garden grow?

### Enjoying nature's show

Beauty in a garden buoys my spirit and banishes winter blues. Although Daffodil Day has passed, still the daffodils look beautiful.

Now flowering also are crocus, muscari, and hyacinths. Soon tulips emerge to flower in October. Herb gardens are shooting after winter dormancy. September guarantees a riot of blossoms.

Plums showed buds early August and as if by magic flowering finished abruptly. Last year barely a plum ripened - the fruit that set was blown off in a single November gale. Nectarines and peaches were similarly affected. Let's hope there is no repeat this year.

Not a lot prevents wind damage, except more shelter. We should have done it years ago.

On my perambulations, I notice lavender, borage, and rosemary hedges flowering blue and purple.

Our bees love it. Rhododendrons and camelias are very pretty, but do not provide safe forage for bees. They enjoy many other flowering shrubs including Ericas, hebes, sages.

It is time to sprinkle seeds of summer flowering annuals cornflowers, poppies, asters, nasturtiums. Plant out seedlings of primulas, petunias, sweet peas.

The fattest wood pigeons ever have discovered our 2-year-old tree lucerne shelter, birds so heavy that branch ends brush the ground. Magnolias are also splendid; so many different shades of these wonderful ornamentals.

In the veg garden it is time to plant the potato chits so you'll have those little perlas for Christmas dinner. Three strong shoots per potato will grow a great crop. Sow bean, pea, and carrot seeds.

And plant asparagus – a firm summer favourite that takes three years of loving attention to crop fully. Plant tarragon to baste the turkey with tarragon butter. Harden off tomato, and pumpkin seeds you have sprouted. Protect from frosts and plant out after Labour Day.

Buckets do a reasonable job of keeping frost off small plants if you haven't many, otherwise head to the garden store for frost cloth. It comes in a range of qualities and prices. We bought expensive material four years ago that is still going very strong – and seems to perform better than the cheaper lightweight products available, which blow away easily in a breeze.

As the ground warms, weeds make an unwelcome appearance. Keep on top of them while you can. Keep calm and carry on gardening!

### Is fake meat for real?

Meat alternative products are generally costly, raising concerns given the current cost of living crisis. New research has said that fake meat is less healthy and more expensive than traditional vegetarian food and protein sources such as legumes, tofu, and falafel products.

According to University of Auckland public health dietitian Leanne Young "Some meat alternatives were quite high in salt generally, and products like meat-free sausages were high in salt and saturated fat.

"The level of processing is also a concern because it goes against what we're recommending with plant-based eating. We're encouraging people to eat more whole and less processed foods," Leanne says.

I have replaced some meat in my diet with non-meat foods that contain protein, although I am not vegetarian. I came from a typical Kiwi family where meat was on our table daily. Not now; I've reduced my meat intake

considerably and still enjoy everything I prepare and eat.

Some non-meat foods that are worth considering are cheap and also nutritious, such as oats, kidney beans, chickpeas, and lentils. I make my own muesli with rolled oats and this month added sunflower seeds, nuts, sultanas, and shredded coconut - those additions all contain protein and oats are heroes.

Beans, chickpeas, lentils, and peas are staples as a protein source, particularly where whole populations are vegetarian. I buy these in dried form (cheaper than meat) or in cans for speed, but at a higher price. Tofu is a star and can be prepared with other foods to become flavoursome as well as ultra-healthy. Bland, it also absorbs flavours well.

Some plant foods contain significantly more protein than others - do some homework. It's worth checking out this research too as it is important for all of us.



# Joining in the tulip festival



### Managing the money-go-round

Could you do with a friendly hand to manage your money better so that it works for you, not the other way round?

A financial mentor from REAP Wairarapa is now available every Wednesday morning at Haumanu House, offering a range of free financial mentoring. REAP's services are client led and the service walks alongside people to help make budgets more sustainable and help set money goals for the future.

Financial mentors can work with families who have fallen behind in paying rent, power and medical bills. Financial mentors can immediately make referrals for foodbank parcels as the foodbank is open at Haumanu House when they are there. And they can ensure that families are receiving correct work and income entitlements and accommodation allowances.

REAP can assist older clients with ensuring that they have a safe and

secure home to live in, the correct accommodation allowances and for those owning their own house, but struggling to pay the rates, there is assistance in applying for a rates rebate.

For young people transitioning to the workforce, there is help with budgeting and setting up a savings plan for future goals.

The mentors have a range of practical tips to support people to save money, and resources to make life financially easier. When you meet with them you will be pleasantly surprised about how they can support and advise you.

With all office holders re-elected and the treasury in good order all augurs well for the future.



Our July meeting was addressed by Chris Peterson, ex-Wairarapa District Councillor, who introduced "Taking the Jump", a recent European


approach to local action to control climate change based on behavioural science.

A New Zealand study last year by global market research company lpsos revealed 72% of Kiwis stated that if we don't act now, we will be failing future generations. This aligns with local sentiment, particularly in the wake of Cyclone Gabrielle, but many of us feel powerless and confused about what we can do at a local and personal level. Where do we start?

Chris told us that "Taking the Jump is an evidence-based, international programme that looks at what can we do that is within our power as ordinary citizens to handle. It starts wherever you're at. It is non-judgmental, practical, constructive, no great hassle – and empowering."

The aim of Take the Jump is to develop and encourage behaviour change, not to go back to the Stone Age, just finding a balance. Less consumption can mean more contentment. There is a helpful website www.takethejump.org.nz

# Project Pulse



### Affordable Waters Reform Update (previously called Three Waters Reform)

Since the reset in April 2023 the NTU (National Transition Unit), a group within the Department of Internal Affairs (DIA), has been working with Regional Steering Groups to further accelerate the establishment programme of the Water Services Entities (WSE).

Councils have expressed a wish for more transparency in the NTU, specifically more clarity around 'go live' dates.

### Stranded Overheads

There are some costs that councils incur that won't transfer to the new entity, such as support services, and electricity etc. For example, the cost of electricity used in our depot is mostly divided between our waters and parks and reserves teams, using rates to cover the cost. Although we will no longer have three waters after transition, we will still use the depot for parks and reserves. While Councils will receive funding to cover these stranded costs, it is only planned to cover the first two years after transition.

We are also awaiting details on the "no worse off" funding, however, this has been delayed many times and it's unclear how this fund will be distributed or if details around the package will change. There is a risk that funding could be reduced from what was initially indicated, or that large Councils claim significantly more than has been allocated.

### **Data Management Improvement**

Over the last year a lot of work has gone into the improvement of 3 Waters and Water Race asset data. A critical part of asset management is to have reliable asset maintenance records.

Using the information collected using Field Maps, we can create real time dashboards that share performance data, including operational performance, instead of multiple spreadsheets that are not displayed in real time. Having Field Maps on our staff's mobile devices allows collection of minimum data required to make a quality asset management decision. High data quality data better equips our teams to make good decisions.



### **Parks and Reserves**

#### **Carrington Park**

The team have been undertaking general maintenance with the junior fenced play area being water blasted and the gate hinges renovated. The broken rail trolley has been replaced on the jungle gym.

### **Howard Booth Park**

A faulty controller on one of the solar lights was replaced to ensure the lights are working as they should.

New seats have been installed with handrails to enable improved accessibility and align with our Positive Ageing Strategy.

#### **Street Reserves**

The hanging baskets have been replanted and hung back up throughout town. Flowering annual displays on Holloway Street and Memorial Square are being maintained by the garden crew as well as the newly planted out street beds.



### **Taverner Street Sewer Renewal**

G&C Diggers and Egis continue to work well together with good progress being made on the sewer main renewal project.

The team has completed the new sewer main and is now in the process of renewing and connecting all the laterals.

The rest of the work is programmed for completion late October, after which the team will move to SH2/High Street North where we are aligning with Waka Kotahi's State Highway renewal programme.



### Other Council updates

### Wastewaster Treatment Ponds Upgrade Project

With most of the scope of work complete for this project and the reservoirs functional and operational, the contractor is now finalising a few minor tasks which includes cleaning up and housekeeping.



The team has made good progress on the pump station building as well as the pipe work connecting our 2 x 2 million litre water tanks to the pump station. The project is progressing well and is on track to be completed on time at the end of November.

### Working with Pasifika o Wairarapa

Our Positive Ageing Strategy Coordinator is continuing to support the Pasifika o Wairarapa organisation that hosts an older Pacific person's event (Aosinasina Group) every Friday. Art and crafts materials are being donated from our old holiday programme supplies, wool is being donated by the Masterton Lions and they received a small amount of funding from Carterton District Council. We have also liaised with Neighbourhood Support and Metlink who are promoting a community services card/Snapper Card discount.

### **Carterton District Youth Council**

Our Youth Development Coordinator is relaunching our Youth Council. Part of this is a review of what has been done in the past and touching base with the rangatahi who were involved last year, as well as those who took part in our Te Rautaki Rangatahi o Wairarapa: Wairarapa Youth Strategy engagement work and expressed interest in joining the Youth Council.

### Wairarapa Library Service (WLS)

Improving the physical state and range of reading material across the WLS collection has been a focus for the team over the past two years. In 2022/23 collection turnover (the number of times books in a collection have been circulated) has increased from 2.32 (2021/22) to 2.56 which is above the average across NZ and Australian peer libraries.

Usage of digital collections in 2022/23 has seen 14,703 eBooks, 10,172 eAudiobooks and 5,259 eMagazines issued.

There were 945 new members in 2022/23 (568 for SWDC and 377 for CDC). The total active membership of WLS sits at 10,525 at 30 June 2023 (4,474 for SWDC and 6051 for CDC).

### **Events Centre usage update**

<u>Total Events</u> (Private/Community and public – not including internal meetings): 1850, a 42% increase on the previous year. <u>Total tickets sold</u> in 22/23 to public events: 9304, a 54% increase on the previous year.

### Rose notes

### Rubbing your eyes

Look for eyes developing facing into the centre of your rose bush and rub them off. If you have triple eyes starting, rub off the outside eyes leaving one eye to develop.

Watch out for aphids on the new growth, spray them perhaps using a biological control rather than a general insecticide that kills all beneficial insects and our precious bees.

You can use a fungicide spray to prevent fungus and the dreaded black spot. Also watch out for caterpillars they can cause lots of damage to your new growth.

If you didn't mulch your garden bed earlier, do so now after feeding your roses - remember do not feed your new plants.

Mulch should generally be organic such as compost, grass clippings even shredded newspapers as they decompose

Hoe your beds keeping them weed free. If you get windy conditions watch that your beds don't dry out.


Another day we went to Carterton library and made candles. We chose the smell – I chose grapefruit.



### Joinery site proves popular

The Mobil Service Station at 191-201 High St North occupies the site that was originally Arnold Richard Wallis Carterton Joinery.

AR Wallis was born in Nelson on 30 April 1846 and died on 3 September 1941 at Okaiawa, South Taranaki.

He established a joinery shop and building business in Carterton about 1885. His son, RN Wallis, who was also a builder, subsequently took over the running of the

business. Mr Wallis Senior married Susan Forfar, who lived from 1849 until her death in Carterton on 15 April 1915.

The writer has a specific interest in the attached photo as my father, Maurice Hawken, worked for Mr Wallis, for a period at the end of WWI. He is the fifth from right in the group standing at the righthand side of the photo.

Mr Richard Noel Wallis in the late 1920s decided to leave the

district and in May 1928 arranged a sale of his "stock in trade" on the premises. What was a little different about the sale was that all goods were sold without a reserve.

The business continued to operate until the late 1930s and was followed, on the site, by a Mr Watkins who operated a bottle collection business and was for a short period, an auto parts business run by a family from Wellington.

Next on the scene were Messrs

Christison and Price with the former being a panel beater and the latter a motor trimmer, each using half the building for their respective trades. They completed the purchase of the site in the late 1930s.

There have been several changes since then, with the acquisition in 1947 of the of the Bredin and Leith Garage and Engineering business, located on the south side of the present service station, by Eric Smith and Joe Hare.

This building was demolished by Tunnicliffe Construction in October 1976, along with the old cottage at the rear of the site, where Eric Smith lived. The panel beaters workshop, previously A R Wallis Joinery, was also demolished at this time.

As late as 1998, the Wallis family home still stood at 216 High St North.

# Holy books presented for public use

The Wairarapa branch of the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community recently gifted the Wairarapa Library Service two copies of the Qu'ran printed in Arabic and te reo Māori.

The Qu'ran, in te reo, is Kur'ānu Tapu. Carterton and Martinborough libraries each have a copy.

Considered the Muslim holy book, the Qu'ran sets down laws and commandments governing social and moral behaviour. It has been translated into more than 70 languages worldwide.

This translation of the Qu'ran in te reo, considered the first of its kind in New Zealand, is the work of Shakil Ahmad Monir (1932–2017).

Monir taught himself te reo over several years, using an English-to-Māori dictionary, te reo Māori Bible and a grammar book as his starting points. It would take him another 20 years to translate the Qu'ran before it was finally

We have been having a bit of a love affair with German films this year so scoot in to catch our last one before we delve into French, Chinese and American flavours as we wind down towards the holiday season.


