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

CONGRATULATIONS RUSSELL GEANGE

A life dedicated to sports earns QSM

Fifty years of dedicated service to Carterton swimmers by Russ Geange has been recognised with a Queen's Service Medal in the 2024 New Year Honours List.

It took Russ and his club-mates four long and difficult years to build the pool. It was initially managed by the club, but eventually Russ

was contracted to manage it after the responsibility proved too much for volunteers.

Whether it's learn-to-swim, coaching, school groups, pool maintenance, key hire for lane swimmers, working bees or weekend events, Russ' day is never quiet.

And when someone leaves the pool covers off or lights on at night it's Russ who goes back to put things in order.

As daughter Olivia explains about Russ, "when he commits, he commits" and over that time he "always put swimming first". Olivia was delighted when she heard the QSM announcement and sees it as acknowledgement of his mana in the community. She adds that Russ' wife Pep "has supported him hugely" throughout these 50 years.

Another of Russ's daughters, Emma, said she "had to read it twice" in the paper to register the QSM announcement. She is aware the special attention has been awkward for Russ as "he doesn't like to make a big deal", adding he "left school at 15 to work at the freezing works".

Russ has taken his commitment to coaching and the pool so seriously he has only taken two short overseas holidays in those 50 years, both under orders from his family.

His third daughter Aroha is "very happy for him" but she is also "sad to see the state the pool is in" and can see the effect this has had on him personally. She says Russ' instinct was to decline the QSM out of modesty, but was persuaded to accept it on behalf of everyone who has contributed.

A decade past retirement age now, Russ is still showing up every day to keep the pool going for the many who benefit from its use. Many thanks to you Russell Geange, QSM.

Mr Russell Geange has dedicated 50 years to swimming and rugby in the Carterton area.

Mr Geange has taught generations to swim, to be confident in the water and training them to be their competitive best. He has served as a Carterton Swimming Club office bearer, fundraiser and builder of the club's indoor pool during the 1980s.

He has held positions of Club Captain, Chairman, and President with the Carterton Amateur Swim Club since 1980. He has organised Masters competitions and been selector, timekeeper, referee and judge.

He established Russell Geange Swim Academy in 1998, with several of the swim teams and individuals he has coached reaching success in regional, national and international competitions. He has been engaged by Carterton schools to provide learn to swim lessons for young children.

He was awarded a Service Award by Wairarapa Swimming in 1981, Life Member in 1996 and a Service Award from Swimming New Zealand in 2001. In 2023 he won Coach of the Year and People's Choice Award at the Wairarapa Sports Awards.

He has played rugby and coached for the Carterton Rugby club for several decades. Mr Geange was awarded the Distinguished Service Award from the Carterton Rugby Football Club in 2021.

GARDENING GUIDE

How does your garden grow?



Gardens taking a hiding

Is the dry biting at your place? The green of early summer has faded fields and lawns yellow to brown. Any drop of rain, or a cool night, is welcomed.

The heat in January/February is difficult for most living things. Whatever you are, sunburn is not your friend. Natural evapotranspiration robs the ground long before midday of whatever moisture came by way of dew at night.

Feeding baleage to the cattle is a daily routine now. It takes top priority as green pick is slim. Our few sheep are also looking for green and forage the hedgerows where they can get to them. The farmer may be seen frequently armed with more battens than used in a relay race, "battening the hatches" as they say in rough sea.

The garden is of course taking a hiding. The weeds that came while we turned our backs to enjoy family over Christmas/New Year at the beach, are well established and remain to protect the soil from the killer

The onions and leeks flowered and if I was growing for seed, I would be very happy. For the meantime though, they are perfectly ornamental!

Corn and cucumbers are in full production. Scallopini, tomatoes and main crop potatoes are abundant – keep water to the soil, not the leaves. There are cabbages aplenty for coles aw and sauerkraut – the farmer makes around 8 litres of it this time of the year – that is about 10kg of cabbage, which lasts two of us through the winter.

In the orchard, nectarines have finished. Plums (except for Luisa) are ripening well. Another year with no greengages and the Red Beaut and Black Amber had just a handful each. Peaches, especially the Black Boys are filling out. I am looking forward to them in April.

We have an abundance of nashi, green and brown pears, and a host of apple varieties coming along, nicely. Peasgood's Nonsuch has been

dropping far from ripe, quite large apples, for many weeks, illustrating the shortcomings of my late spring fruit thinning. Note to self: continue to thin apples for a decent harvest.

This month, deadhead your flowers and pick plenty for the house. Plant winter cabbage, broccoli, leeks, onions, lettuce, carrots, radish. Pull rhubarb. Mulch everything you plant.

Preserve excess harvest or donate it to the needy. If you have no garden, shop at farmers' markets. These people grow and live local and love producing food sustainably for

Carry on gardening. Like farming, it is an act of faith.

BIG BIKE FILM NIGHT

A feast of short films

In its 10th year, The Big Bike Film Night will be celebrating cycling in all its glorious shapes and forms, returning to Carterton in the Wairarapa region on Monday 18 March with a programme proclaimed as a feast of short films devised and designed for the two-wheel devotee.

With its humble beginnings back in 2015, The Big Bike Film Night is now a much-anticipated Film Festival that brings a love of cycling to cinemas, presenting an array of international and New Zealand movies specifically selected by Taupō based Curator and "Film Pedlar", Brett Cotter.

"Each year I set out with just one goal – to bring together the best cycling short films from around the world for our audiences, celebrating the fun, the adventure, and inspiration that bikes enable," says Brett.

"Our 2024 collection contains 10 mesmerising films that are as varied and diverse as you could hope for. This global programme contains a

strong contingent of Kiwi films, including a World premiere, alongside an assortment of international films having their New Zealand premiere here as well."

Double Everest, shot against Queenstown's panoramic backdrop, follows boundary-pushing rider Ben Hildred on his latest quest. "Everesting" is a feather few cyclists have in their caps and its concept is fiendishly simple: Pick any hill, anywhere in the world and complete repeats of it in a single ride until you climb 8,848m – the equivalent height of Mt Everest.

"The power of storytelling is at the forefront of what we offer, and the belief that the humble bicycle can improve our health, inspire and uplift people with where it can take us; connecting communities with stories that captivate us, stories that make us think, and most importantly of all-inspiring us to get out and ride," says Brett.

Modernising the rooms

The renovation of one of our oldest rest home wings is well under way at Carter Court.

The Deller wing – built in 1963 – is being renovated to modernise the rooms and to ensure they have en-suites and are more fit for purpose. Sam and the team at Tararua Builders are doing great work completing the job with as little disruption as possible for the existing residents of Carter Court.

As part of the upgrade, we are also refurbishing our current respite room. The upgrade of the room is funded by Hospice Wairarapa with the ongoing operational cost funded by Te Whatu Ora Wairarapa. This room will continue to be used for respite and will be the only dedicated palliative care bed in the Wairarapa. We are really looking forward to opening up and admitting residents into our six new rooms and the respite/palliative care room.

Carter Court Rest Home is a not-for-profit community-based aged residential care facility providing a range of services including hospital and rest home care, respite care, day activity program, palliative care and health recovery.

The incredible financial support from the Wairarapa community to assist us with this much needed upgrade is very much appreciated by the Carter Society executive, staff and residents of Carter Court.

HATO HONE ST JOHN

St John is here to help

Hato Hone St John has a fresh focus on community health in the Wairarapa region, with the appointment of community engagement coordinator, Rosie Julou.

Rosie has worked in the non-profit sector for several years, running training and development company Exult. While she is new to the area – and loving life in Martinborough. She has jumped straight into meeting local organisations, and connecting with people to spread the word about Hato Hone St John's community health programmes.

Rosie says, "Hato Hone St John volunteers have been established in the Wairarapa for over 100 years, and it has been so inspiring to see firsthand the work they do to run the health shuttles, support the wider community and train the next generation of paramedics via the St John Youth Cadets."

"We have a unique situation in the Wairarapa, with Wellington Free Ambulance providing emergency ambulance services. This means that Hato Hone St John can focus exclusively on community health services in this area, which aim to help provide better access to health care, and ultimately reduce the need for urgent care services. Wellington Free Ambulance provide the frontline paramedics who respond to 111 calls; whereas Hato Hone St John will be there to offer access to community health."

Hato Hone St John has four health shuttles based in Masterton and Greytown, one of which is able to take wheelchairs. The 25 volunteer drivers can take clients to any health or wellbeing appointment and also to Wellington hospitals. To book, call 0800 589 630. The service is free however, koha is always appreciated.

MOANA WETLANDS

Boom of the matuku

Years of restoration and predator control have given critically endangered native bird populations the chance to thrive in the Wairarapa Moana Wetlands.

The matuku-hūrepo or Australasian bittern's threat status is the last step before extinction, with fewer than 1,000 birds living in wetlands across Aotearoa. Nestled in the Wairarapa Moana Wetlands, these rare native birds meld into the grasses and raupo, found only by their booming call.

Matuku are secretive, stealthy and difficult to spot due to their camouflage. To count the birds, stand in the wetlands just before dawn or dusk, and listen for the booms of the males' call.

The best time to hear a bittern is between September and February during their breeding season. Roger Uys, senior environmental scientist at Greater Wellington, says more matuku have been heard at the Wairarapa Moana Wetlands than ever before.

"Not so long ago there was serious national concern that the bittern population was going backwards," says Uys. "Now I can confidently say the bittern are thriving at Wairarapa Moana. Both the bittern and spotless crake nest on the ground, where they're vulnerable with nests in easy reach of stoats and hedgehogs. Hearing the breeding matuku is a special sign that all the restoration efforts are working."

The Wairarapa Moana Wetlands are one of the few wetlands in Aotearoa recognised as a Ramsar site of international significance. Locally, Māori pūrākau and

connection to the area run as deep as the lake.

Ngāti Kahungunu ki Wairarapa kaiwhakahaere taiao Rawiri Smith belongs to the Wairarapa Moana Wetlands project. "In te ao Māori, the male matuku booms in loneliness and despair. The matuku and its calls were woven into waiata and korero to comfort people in their grief. The calls still hold that chilling feeling, as we grieve the loss of 97% of the repo (wetlands) that surrounded Wairarapa Moana."

It was Greater Wellington's Senior Biosecurity Officer Steve Playle who set up the intricate network of 470 traps in 2013. "I've known the wetlands for more than 40 years. I saw my role in leading the wetland's predator control as an opportunity to give back to the land. We've removed thousands of hedgehogs and rats, hundreds

of ferrets, feral cats and mice from the Wairarapa Moana. And now we're seeing endangered wildlife

Visitors to the Wairarapa Moana

may hear the booms bellowing across the wetlands, or see a matuku standing upright with its beak toward the sky, imitating the tall rāupo.

Flood resilience funding secured

The Carterton District Council has secured support for innovative Flat Point Flood resilience project.

This is a further step towards improving coastline resilience against extreme weather and flooding as CDC continues to tackle climate change impacts and boost recovery from the aftermath of Cyclones Hales and Gabrielle.

CDC has successfully secured \$350,000 from the Local Government Flood Resilience Co-Investment Fund for its Flat Point Flood resilience project.

This funding injection will be channelled into enhancing flood resilience at Flat Point, the heart of Carterton District's coastal community, consisting of 100 properties frequently affected by surface water flooding during heavy rainfall.

The innovative initiative will investigate the construction of a planted earthen bund around Flat Point's northern and western boundaries, redirecting surface water into the ocean.

Cyclone debris will be redeployed in building this protective bund

with planted native flora also playing a part in resisting the flooding. Geoff Hamilton, chief executive of CDC, expressed his delight in receiving support for this vital project, emphasising its alignment with the Fund's vision for climate change resilience.

'We are confident the work aligns with the vision behind the fund to ensure that our people, places, and systems are resilient and able to adapt to the effects of unavoidable climate change," he said.

"CDC remains committed to increasing resilience within our planning and for a more prepared future and fostering such partnerships with central Government and other stakeholders supports our planning."

The Cyclone Recovery Unit, part of the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet administers the Local Government Flood Resilience Co-Investment Fund. "We are grateful for the award and look forward to working together to safeguard one of our most vulnerable communities," Geoff said.

CDC will join forces with Crown Infrastructure Partners to plan and execute this project in the coming weeks and months.

Watering is vital

With this hot weather, watering your roses is important.

A deep watering twice a week is best as the water will soak down into the root system and this is where it is needed most.

Keep dead-heading your roses and keep up the spraying. You can give your beds a light feed with fertiliser. Make sure the fertiliser is well watered in, spreading it just before rain is good.

Never put fertiliser on to dry soil, make sure the soil is well watered-in and hoed.

Keep the surface of your beds loose and weed free.

After a summer trim and dead-heading, your roses will generally flower again in 55 to 60 days. If you have a special date in mind, this gives you a rough guide as to what you can expect.

Summer herb bonanza

Every evening when it's cool enough to go outside, I head into the garden and see which herbs are ready for harvesting – bergamot, basil, rosemary, calendula, comfrey, lavender; the list goes on.

Some herbs get turned into remedies, some get eaten, some given away and some are just left to their own devices. I dry and store a lot of herbs for later use and I tincture fresh plant material. I've also made a golden-coloured calendula oil. It really is an abundant time, even if you only have a small garden or pots.

If you want to get some ideas and information on growing and using herbs, please consider becoming a member of the Wairarapa Herb Society. For \$20 a year you will be sent our local newsletter (Chamomile), the Herb Federation newsletter as well as enjoy access to our meetings, garden visits, herb book library, sales table and events. You're welcome to drop in on a meeting and meet some of our relaxed and cheerful crew.

Each meet-up we have "herb of the month", recommended book of the month, a catch-up on what's on, and a presenter talking about their area of expertise. Delay to rating updates

Updated rating valuations for Carterton and South Wairarapa are now planned to be sent to property owners from 17 April 2024.

Revaluations of all properties across the two districts were due to be finalised in February 2024. However, the Office of the Valuer General (OVG), the government body that oversees all rating valuations, has agreed with Quotable Value (QV) that it should take more time to work on the district's updated rating valuations before they are set to be finalised and released to the district's property owners.

This is due to a range of factors that have impacted on the work of QV, New Zealand's largest valuation and property services company, including Covid-19, changing regulatory requirements, and the complexity of the rural sector.

QV national revaluation manager Tim Gibson said this additional time will help to ensure greater accuracy of the rating valuations.

"The OVG's audit is an important part of the rating revaluation process that does take a great deal of time and effort. It has been delayed this time because we still need to thoroughly review a number of values within the district," he said.

"We are now taking the extra time required to do that before submitting it for independent audit. Due to OVG workloads, that will not be until early March."

The new values will be based on the most likely selling price if the property had sold on the valuation date, which was 1 September 2023, and will be used to help inform rates for the 2024/2025 rating year. They are solely used for the purpose of determining the equitable share of rates are distributed fairly across property owners in the district, and are not intended to be used as market valuations.

As per the usual process, if owners do not agree with their new rating valuation once it has been notified, they have until 24 May to lodge an objection with QV.

The information regarding the objection process with QV will be sent along with the new valuations later this year. Your Council is not responsible for the new rating valuations.

A link to the past

The first Carterton Golf Club resulted from a meeting initiated by Mr William Henry Booth, held on 9 May 1911 to discuss the formation of a golf club on land made available on his property on Andersons Line.

He provided two paddocks for the club's use, marked out the course and instructed members who had volunteered their services on how to prepare it. Play initially got underway in May and continued through 1912. Club accommodation was in the form of a shed offered by Mr Booth and was located by Mr R Wallis to the course for £3-10 shillings and reroofed for £1-10.

A professional coach, Mr McEwan, was available, charging two shillings and sixpence per lesson. The course was used until early 1913 when a deputation from met with executives of the Carterton Racing Club to negotiate the possible formation of a golf course on property owned by the Racing Club. Permission was granted with the initial year being rent free and subsequent years by negotiation.

Following a concerted effort by members volunteering to prepare the course in accordance with the layout, again planned by Mr Booth, opening day occurred on 5 April 1913.

World War 1 ended the club's activities until the early 1920s, with equipment being held in storage. By 1922, fairways and greens were prepared following initial work by volunteers using rollers brought in from Middlerun.

In the 1920s the club made moves to become more

professional, applying for membership of the New Zealand Union (Golf) in 1924 and the New Zealand Golf Association Ladies Golf Union in 1926.The Club's Constitution was drafted by Mr DL Taverner and approved by the committee.

War again impacted the club, with the decision being taken in 1942 to go into recess and again put the equipment into storage as the Racing Club's property was being occupied by the military for training purposes.

By 1945 the decision to look to purchasing land to form the

club's own course had been taken with the investigating committee of Messrs Clarke, Broadbent, Harrington, Dudson, Whitwell and Goodin suggesting the Smith's Estate on Chester Rd, being 120 acres at an asking price of £3,250 as a suitable option.

The purchase was finalised by way of donations and debentures and during 1946–1947 the first 13 holes were developed with predominantly voluntary labour of club members and hiring trucks from local Councils. The official opening occurred on 31 May 1947, with the course increasing to 15

holes in 1948 and to a full 18 holes in 1949. Sadly, Mr Booth, who had such an influence on the club from its early days, passed away shortly before the official opening.

Since then, the course has been lengthened to almost 6000 yards, with various improvements made to the clubhouse and the facility continues to be a major asset to Carterton as well as a tribute to the volunteers whose input made it possible.

KAIPAITANGATA TRUST

Reserve celebrates 75 years

At a dawn ceremony in January, Kaipaitangata marked its 75th birthday with the release of another six kokako.

After a traditional welcome and karakia from iwi, the new kokako were released into the reserve by students from the Kaipaitangata

Anne Rexwood from Kaipaitangata eco-village then spoke. "The local community helped establish the reserve 75 years ago. We have morphed into a co-operative, gradually buying land at the top of Kaipaitangata Rd and so creating a vibrant community. We are proud to have provided a base for the reserve trust over the years, and of the many volunteer hours we have put in to make Kaipaitangata such a special place."

Tribute was paid to the mayor and councillors who, 75 years ago, agreed to the establishment of the reserve on 300 hectares of council land, downstream from the water supply intake. It was not an obvious choice for a scrubby bit of land. And there has been a huge spin-off benefit for Carterton. The reserve is a wonderful recreational asset, and a big boost to the local tourist industry.

John Cody, chair of the Kaipaitangata Trust which manages the reserve, lauded both the vision of the locals who campaigned to establish the reserve and to the volunteers who have maintained the reserve and the predator-proof fence over the years.

Cody also thanked Forest and Bird for allowing the Trust to manage Fensham Reserve as well, so providing access to the income from the leased land at Fensham. I should also note that as Kaipaitangata opened up as a recreational place for locals, it has taken the pressure off Fensham Reserve which, 75 years ago, was being loved to death."

Destination Wairarapa general manager Anna Nielson says that the festival is always a much-anticipated event on the Wairarapa events calendar.


