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
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

Embracing change, making the connection

This year began with a lightbulb moment – volunteers Debbie and Linda visited the Featherston foodbank.

“I realised that we were making choices about food parcels with no knowledge about what people might actually want. There was no connection between the clients and us,” Debbie says.

There is an evolving trend with foodbanks to work in partnership with clients, empowering them to make their own choices about their food needs. This has the benefit of reducing food waste. As Debbie says “why give people tea when they actually drink coffee?”

Carterton foodbank intends to build a stronger connection with its clients by instituting a meet and greet space. Here clients can chat to a volunteer and choose their own groceries from a basic list. They can also make selections from the choosing table that offers optional extras such as donations from local cafés – Wild Oats, Clareville Bakery and Good Bitches Baking, and seasonal fruit and vegetables from Vagabond Vege, Spray Free Vegetables and WaiWaste. The foodbank is also receiving a good selection of protein and fruit from WaiWaste.

We were overwhelmed by the generosity of our community who supported last year’s food drive. Currently our monthly expenditure on staple food items sits around \$1500. We are in the process of approaching various trusts and charities for funds.

We are also interested in the possibility of “product sponsorship”. One local family is already making monthly donations to cover the cost of buying crackers. Could your family become our tea bag champions? Please contact John at carterton.foodbank@gmail.com if this idea appeals to you.

If you could you spare some time once a fortnight to volunteer for an hour or so, please contact John. We need two or three more volunteers at present. If you have extra produce from your home garden you can drop it off to us at Haumanu House behind the Clock Tower, weekdays 10am to 11am.

REAP Wairarapa now at Haumanu House

And along came REAP. Carterton Foodbank is delighted to welcome a financial mentor from REAP Wairarapa to Haumanu House in Carterton every Wednesday.

REAP Wairarapa offers free financial mentoring with its Building Financial Capabilities team, a client-led service helping people make their budgets more sustainable and set money goals for the future.

Financial mentors work with families who have fallen behind in paying rent, power and medical bills. They can assess whether families are receiving correct work and income entitlements and accommodation allowances.

They assist older clients to ensure they have a safe and secure home to live in and the correct accommodation allowances. They can also assist in applying for a rates rebate.

For young people transitioning to the workforce, there is help with budgeting and setting up a savings plan for future goals.

Foodbank and REAP Wairarapa are working together. REAP can immediately refer a client for a food parcel on the spot and assist the client to create a food budget, with provision for food parcels in the future, if needed.

How does your garden grow?



"In the light of the moon, a little egg lay on a leaf," begins the much-loved Eric Carle children's story about a caterpillar.

Indeed, the eggs of the cabbage white butterfly are really small, barely perceptible, and everywhere. They turn into very hungry caterpillars in about five days.

At the end of February, they are abundant, including on newly purchased seedlings. You could use derris dust to deter the butterflies from laying or brush off the eggs gently by thumb, so they cannot hatch on your plant.

Last year wasps decimated our apples and were problematic around the bee hives. To control the infestation, we baited the orchard and have barely any wasps this year. It is our bees that have been hungry for nashi pears. I'm sure the sacrifice will be worth it when we harvest honey next season – will it have notes of nashi pear?

Fifteen years ago, we planted our first pine nut tree. At the time I had no idea how difficult it might be to grow pine nuts. Now wiser, I appreciate why pine nuts are both delicious and relatively expensive. This year we harvested the first pine nut cone and processed it producing a bit less than a single tablespoon – about 70 kernels.

The first cone took three years to grow to maturity; one cone produced 150 nuts of which 50% contained good kernels. We used vice grips to crack the nuts and pinch off the end to remove the kernel. There aren't many cones on the tree, but at least we have had a taste of things to come and perhaps we won't eat them all at once.



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INDOOR POOL

Swimming in myths

The indoor pool project group has heard some myths out there in the community. Kellee McCurdy from the club has agreed to bust four of the bigger ones.

Myth #1: It's a club facility. Kellee says the pool was built for the community, by community volunteers on council land and it's not a private facility. A range of local businesses and service groups have helped build and maintain the pool over the years. It's used by a cross-section of the community, including learn-to-swim toddlers, seniors' aqua-aerobics, school groups, local group bookings (like Thrive) and lane-swimming for key-holders. The pool does not draw on ratepayer funds.

Myth #2: It's run for profit. Kellee explains that the club has been a charitable incorporated society since 2015. The club owns the facility but leases the site from council. It contracts operation of the pool locally and relies substantially on fund-raising for repairs and improvements.

Myth #3: It's not a suitable community pool. Kellee accepts the pool is not flash but it does the job. The 0.9m depth is perfect for learners and pretty good for the mobility-impaired, seniors and physical rehabilitation. It's just deep enough for club purposes and the small volume is very efficient for heating and cleaning. It's the only non-private indoor pool in the southern Wairarapa, which is underserved per-capita for indoor swimming. Carterton council supports the rebuild, but no southern Wairarapa councils are planning for an indoor aquatic facility. It meets all community aquatic needs except leisure and recreation, which is provided by local councils.

Myth #4: It's run down. While the building is due for retirement, the pool tank is structurally sound and does not leak. A new building will ensure another 50 years of indoor swimming for the Carterton and southern Wairarapa community.


The main gallery exhibition is Lisa Chandler, a prominent New Zealand contemporary history painter, with her show *Landscapes of Loss*.

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Rose notes

Bloomin' pesky caterpillars

March is a good time to remove roses that have not done well in your garden. Roses take three years to establish, so don't be too hasty with your decision.

When replacing your roses, look for a variety that is healthy.

Now the weather is cooling, your flowers will be smaller and caterpillars and aphids may become more troublesome. When dealing with these pests using sprays, please be careful of our bees. Spray early in the morning so the spray can dry before the bees start working or spray later in the evening when they have gone back to their hives.

Only spray if absolutely necessary and think of using biological controls – these work well.

Keep watering and stake all basal shoots, which will grow and have time to mature before you start pruning in July.

A light feed now will help your autumn flowers.

CARTERTON LIBRARY

It's going to need a big cake

Carterton Library turns 150 on 24 March, making it New Zealand's oldest continuously operating library.

Imagine a time when books were a luxury and literacy wasn't widespread. Most people could only enjoy books at "readings" held in private homes where they would pay a penny to attend.

In 1873, the year before Carterton Library was established, Charles Roeking Carter purchased 200 books from London with money raised for the purpose. Originally open only to paying members, money from subscriptions enabled the building of a purpose-built library

Opened in 1881 the original building still stands with a sympathetic modern extension and remains a beloved local landmark for the community.

These days, the library is part of the Wairarapa Library Service that includes Featherston, Greytown and Martinborough Libraries. It's open to everyone and free to join. It's also part of a network of lower North Island libraries, which gives borrowers access to a combined collection of over a million items. Best of all, it doesn't cost to reserve and borrow books from any of these libraries.

As a community hub, it's much more than books. Whether it's a quiet spot to work/study, read the newspapers or to choose magazines and DVDs for a lazy weekend. The little ones can enjoy story-time or fun after-school activities. You can take advantage of free Wi-Fi, check your emails and do some printing.

Our upgraded animal facility close to completion

Our upgraded animal facility is close to completion after a new value-for-money option brought new life into the project. Initial costing on a new build pound for stray dogs and other animals was originally \$370,000 to \$500,000.

Council chose not to proceed at those figures. However, working with local companies, a modification of the existing site was created for a fraction of the cost, at \$79,000.

Work started in 2023 and the facility is almost complete, with fencing and power now required.

Transport Choices – Bike Sheds

Ponatahi Christian School did not want a new bike shed but we have funded the painting of their existing shed. 
Dalefield Road Water Storage Tanks & Pump Station

Wastewater Reservoirs

Waikato Regional Council have issued the Code of Compliance certificates for the reservoir construction. WRC is one of only three councils in the country with accreditation for dams and reservoir compliance management. The reservoirs are now complete and in operation.



High Street North Water Main

G&C Diggers started on the water main in early November, and completed work in January. The team is now currently installing the new laterals and are close to completion.



Easter lift-off

Feed people, not landfill

Founded in 2015, Waiwaste rescues food that is good enough to eat but not good enough to sell.

Our staff and volunteers work in the Wairarapa, collecting from supermarkets, growers, cafes, bakeries and producers who recognise they can help their community by handing on food to us. We distribute it to local community organisations that support people who are struggling to feed their families.

Waiwaste is the New Zealand Food Network Hub for the Wairarapa and receives bulk rescued goods from its logistics centres. We are the wholesale arm of food security in the Wairarapa while the foodbanks and other community organisations are the retail arms. In Carterton we support the Carterton Food Bank, Carterton Village Charitable Trust and the Safer Communities Trust.

We collect and deliver food from across the Wairarapa and Tararua district, and have two fully electric vans that are always on the go. Our facilities include a warehouse in Hope St that has a large walk-in freezer and chiller, where we sort, store and distribute food to our recipient groups. From its inception Waiwaste has distributed over 672,305kg of food and the volume has continued to increase significantly over the past three years.

Greytown’s Molewood Orchard is opening again this year for pick-your-own apples.

Last year was the first time the family-run orchard had been open to the public. The initiative was greeted with huge enthusiasm, with people travelling from throughout the Wairarapa and much further afield to pick fresh sun-warmed fruit off the trees.

The Cooke family, who returned to managing Molewood Orchard in 2022, is delighted to be preparing for another pick-your-own season. The Cookes are looking to build on the success of last year and have a number of new initiatives to introduce to the public.

WHO identifies back pain as world's No.1 cause of disability

The World Health Organisation (WHO) has stated that back pain is the leading cause of disability globally. In 2020, about 1 in 13 people, equating to 619 million people, experienced lower back pain (LBP) – a 60% increase from 1990.

We live in a world where humanity has its sights set on the colonisation of Mars. Yet we haven't figured out some basic things, such as mental health, obesity and back pain.

But happily, this isn't because issues like back pain and obesity are untreatable or unfathomable. For those of us who are determined to be healthier, there are answers.

There are numerous common causes of mechanical LBP. The most common are muscle weakness, unhealed injuries, emotional stress and issues with the feet. The worst cases of back pain tend to involve a mixture of factors. And Terry was one of these patients.

Terry's back pain started with a sudden jab of knife-like pain while she was lifting some furniture into the back of a car. On the face of it, that seemed like a pretty straightforward injury. But, on closer inspection, it became very clear why this relatively normal lift left her with pain that had not gone away four years later.

Terry's back pain first showed up during a relatively heavy lift. But it also came on within a month of losing her partner to cancer. Sad, but true. She had also injured her right knee six months before the back injury and had been limping ever since.

The combination of grief, poor lifting technique and persistent changes in her body's movement patterns were the real cause of Terry's back pain. Yet, on the face of it, the problem looked like an injury. Back pain is seldom simple.

After four years of excruciating pain and frustrating healthcare interactions, it took only three months of proper treatment to

resolve Terry's pain. And as is typical of chronic pain sufferers, Terry needed a range of treatments in order to recover.

The sad fact about the back pain sufferers who make up the WHO statistics is that they don't get access to the recommended treatments. Most back pain sufferers limit their treatments to the use of pills, and sometimes some stretches or core exercises, as opposed to the type of intensive treatment Terry received.

The WHO recommended:

- Education programmes that support knowledge and self-care strategies
- Exercise programmes; physical therapies, such as spinal manipulative therapy and soft tissue treatments
- Psychological therapies, such as cognitive behavioural therapy
- Medicines, such as non-steroidal anti-inflammatory medicines.

Terry was part of a process that included lots of education, intense soundwave therapy, intense Laser

therapy, dry needling, brainwave entrainment, myofascial cupping, spinal manipulation, Gaston technique, and gluteal muscle strengthening.

And once the work was done, she resumed a completely pain-free existence, happily withdrawing her contribution to the grim statistics highlighted by the WHO.

Grandad's dream in action

Carterton resident Clint Chalmers has found a new lease of life since retiring from teaching six years ago – he's recently discovered the joy of writing and illustrating books for children.

The initial impetus came when he was thinking of what to give one of his grandchildren for Christmas. Jovie has Samoan heritage so Clint created a colouring and activity book for her in Samoan.

It worked out so well that he followed it up with a poetry book called Grandad's Dream, in which each page relates to one of his six grandchildren and what they love to do.

"We took the two books down to our family Christmas get-together on the West Coast last year," says Clint. "The kids loved them and both our daughters shed a few tears when they saw them. That was pretty special."

Clint has since gone on to create English and Māori versions of the colouring books and other books, including journals and children's picture books. His best seller in New Zealand and on Amazon is "The Alphabet Book".

Recent developments in technology have made it much easier for Clint to produce and sell the books. Once he's written the text, he creates the illustrations using some AI and other computer graphics programs. The publisher, Amazon, prints and posts a book on demand when ordered.

"For me, the books build on my 40 years teaching experience and my passion for children's learning," Clint explains. "I want to see them getting off their phones and enjoying and loving books. It's exciting



when one of your books sells – and we sell many in New Zealand, including to schools and parents."

Richard Nicholas "Dickey" Sayer

Richard Burgess Sayer left England on the 15 September 1839 on the ship "Oriental". He landed at Port Nicholson, Wellington, four and a half months later on 31 January 1840. He was an assisted immigrant and described as single, a bricklayer and 21 years of age.

Richard died on 26 December 1854 leaving his wife, Jemima Sayer, nee Oxenham and his son Richard Nicholas "Dickey" Sayer. Jemima married John Ashmore in 1855 and the family relocated to the Wairarapa.

John Ashmore was commissioned by the Wellington Provincial Council to build the Black Bridge over the Waiohine River but he ran out of funds in 1858 and the project was taken on by Charles Rooking Carter.

A year later Ashmore moved

out of the area when Ngati Kahungunu, leader of Ngatuere Tawhirimatea Tawhao threatened to burn his house down after he refused to pay local Maori for grazing rights. However, 14-year-old Dickey Sayer, who was a friend of Ngatuere, remained.

With no funds, he survived living as a hunter and the logical choice of shelter was a slab whare.

This was a simple box-like, one roomed house, that could be easily built by a single man with very little outlay other than his labour and basic tools such as a heavy iron wedge.

It is likely that his carpentry skills were developed by working with his stepfather on the Black Bridge. Whether he did or not, he took considerable trouble to

chamfer each slab to ensure each totara board, harvested from trees growing on the land, would slide neatly in behind each other. It is considered that Sayer's slab whare is a unique survivor of the provenance in Wairarapa and is still standing today.

RAILWAY CROSSINGS

New rail safety measures

Carterton District Council welcomes the new rail safety measures KiwiRail and Greater Wellington Regional Council have confirmed, as part of their ongoing commitment to upgrade the Wairarapa Line Service.

KiwiRail and Greater Wellington Regional Council have announced the findings of their report into Wairarapa rail crossings following last year's announcement over potential crossing closures on the Wairarapa Line.

In May 2023, KiwiRail undertook individual assessments of each

of the 30 crossings as part of its work to prepare a more frequent and faster commuter service between Masterton and Wellington. It proposed 23 level crossings with flashing warning lights, bells, and barrier arms and closing 7 level crossings. This included a number of crossings in Carterton.

Following meetings last year, KiwiRail carried out an independent assessment that considered safety and the broader implications to the road network and community.

Among of the findings, the report recommends closing five level crossings across Wairarapa and upgrading 25 more. The closures would include Rhodes St and Victoria St in Carterton.

It was decided to keep Pembroke St open, which was of notable

concern to emergency services and the community.


The KiwiRail project team will be working from south to north, with a targeted completion date of mid to late March 2026.

Closing Rhodes St and Victoria St vehicle crossings will still mean continued pedestrian access across the tracks. Brooklyn, Pembroke, and Kent Sts will all remain open, with lights and barriers upgraded and/or installed.

Ron Mark, mayor of Carterton, said the Council and community have worked hard in negotiations with KiwiRail to achieve a better outcome than we anticipated when the project was first announced.

"The track upgrades and increased rail service will boost Wairarapa's transport connections, and the benefits outweigh the potential impacts the two closures will have," he said.
